AFFORDABLE HOUSING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Community Development Long Island: \$25,000 to maintain and expand an online zoning map to encourage affordable housing development.

ERASE Racism: \$30,000 to continue coordinating a coalition for affordable housing on Long Island.

Long Island Housing Partnership: \$20,000 to reduce housing discrimination through outreach, education, and technical assistance.

Long Island Housing Services: \$15,000 to provide homebuyers with the information to safeguard against biased home appraisals.

Regional Plan Association: \$25,000 to help develop a regional workforce development plan.

Uniondale Community Land Trust: \$25,000 to increase affordable homeownership opportunities and promote housing stability in Uniondale.

ANIMAL WELFARE

North Shore Animal League: \$30,000 to rescue dogs from puppy mills and place them for adoption.

Paws of War: \$30,000 to rescue abused, neglected, and mistreated animals and place them for adoption with veterans and first responders.

ARTS & CULTURE

Patchogue Arts Council: \$20,000 to present innovative, cultural programming to the Patchogue community and expand access for artists.

Stage the Change: \$15,000 to use the arts to connect high school students from racially and economically diverse communities.

Teatro Experiment Al Yerbabruja: \$15,000 to provide access for Latinx/Brown and Black artists to showcase their work.

Long Island Alzheimer's and Dementia Center: \$20,000 to provide cognitive stimulation for homebound individuals with dementia and respite services for their caregivers.

Atlantic Marine Conservation Society: \$35,000 to respond to sea turtle strandings.

ChangeHampton Inc.: \$26,000 to expand a community pollinator garden and promote sustainable landscaping practices.

Citizens Campaign Fund for The Environment and Group for The East End: \$100,000 to raise awareness and educate voters about the Water Quality Restoration Fund for Suffolk County.

Friends of Bellport Bay: \$20,00 for oyster restoration in the Great South Bay.

Great South Bay Audubon Society: \$12,500 to create a community pollinator garden and promote sustainable landscaping practices.

Adventures In Learning: \$20,000 to improve the reading skills of elementary students in the Manhasset Union Free School District.

Girls Inc. of Long Island: \$20,000 to provide leadership development and college and career readiness skills for high school girls.

Grenville Baker Boys & Girls Club: \$20,000 for a college preparation program for low-income, Latino students From Locust Valley and Glen Cove High Schools.

Hamptons Art Camp D/B/A Hamptons Community Outreach: \$20,000 to improve the academic achievement and college readiness of students in the Bridgehampton School District.

LONG ISLAND AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT FUND

\$10,000 to develop an affordable and equitable housing initiative for Long Island

CCFE identifies key environmental concerns in New York and Connecticut and through research, public education and lobbying has successfully advanced programs that benefit the natural environment and public health.
